<u>Ministry Responsibility</u> (adapted from Emanuel's Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions 2020) The Congregation Council has general oversight of the life and activities of this congregation, and in particular its worship life, to the end that everything be done in accordance with the Word of God and the faith and practice of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The Congregation Council is responsible for the financial and property matters of this congregation. The duties of the Congregation Council include, but is not limited to, the following:

- To lead this congregation in stating its mission, to do long-range planning, to set goals and priorities, and to evaluate its activities in light of its mission and goals.
- To seek to involve all members of this congregation in worship, learning, witness, service, and support.
- To oversee and provide for the administration of this congregation to enable it to fulfill its functions and perform its mission.
- To maintain supportive relationships with the rostered minister(s) and staff and help them annually to evaluate the fulfillment of their calling or employment.
- To be examples individually and corporately of the style of life and ministry expected of all baptized persons.
- To promote a congregational climate of peace and goodwill and, as differences and conflicts arise, to endeavor to foster mutual understanding.
- To emphasize support of the synod and churchwide organization of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America as well as cooperation with other congregations, both Lutheran and non-Lutheran, subject to established policies of the synod and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.
- To maintain and protect Emanuel's Lutheran Church property and manage its business and fiscal affairs.
- To employ and supervise the staff of this congregation.
- President duties: Facilitate Congregation Council meetings, executive committee meetings, and congregation meetings. Is the liaison to the Mutual Ministry Committee.

2022 Highlights and Challenges

- By Emanuel's Constitution, Bylaws, and Continuing Resolutions 2020 section C12.03. should a member's place on the Congregation Council be declared vacant, the Congregation Council shall elect, by majority vote, a successor until the next annual meeting. Mr. Bill Meier was elected to fill the vacant Council position. Bill is a lifelong member of Emanuel's and served as an usher for many years, a member of the Heritage Bible Class, and is also a member of the Property Stewards. Thank you, Bill, for serving on the Congregation Council.
- Easter this year was one many highlights for me. Seeing all of the kids and some grown-ups hunting Easter eggs from the Day School and from the Church, I think that some of the parents had more than the fun the kids did.
- After long talks and over a year delay because of COVID the Capital Campaign finally got underway, with Pastor Marcus, Karen Weinstein, and Stephen Anderson leading the way and with the great team that the Pastor, Karen, and Stephen had assembled, I knew that this project was going to be a big success and was it ever.
- As I'm writing this Annual Report the renovations are well underway in the Fellowship Hall and in the restrooms throughout the Church and even at this stage of renovation you can tell it's going to look wonderful.
- The Phase 1 Build Team lead by Pastor Marcus, Garry Miller "Emanuel's on site superintendent" with team members Clifton Micheli, Karen Weinstein, Jeannie Hall, Jeanne Palmer, and Allan Bode. The last item of business of the annual meeting was the approval of the 2023 budget, the budget was approved by paper ballot.

Senior Pastor 2022 Annual Report Pastor Marcus Bigott

Ministry Responsibility

I serve as the Senior Pastor of Emanuel's Lutheran Church and Day School, teaching, preaching, and administering the sacraments. I have the joy of leading a staff of nine that support and guide the financial, administrative, bereavement and family support, music and worship, day school, and youth ministries of our congregation. I help shape and live into the outreach mission, vision, and strategic plan of our congregation while volunteering as a community leader on a number of city, county, Synod, and national, board, commissions, and partner agencies.

2022 Highlights

- 123 Confirmation Cohort: We continue to mold and shape our confirmation program as partnerships change, schedules, fill, and class ebb and flow. We are blessed this year to be continue our long-standing partnership with Spirit of Joy and Pastor Megan. We have rotated each month, beginning in August, between our two campuses and our smaller groups are providing great conversation and study. We completed our New Testament year in the spring and began our Lutheran year, a year in Luther's *Small Catechism*, in the fall.
- Couple's Night Out: I set about to create a new way for the younger couples of our congregation to gather together for fellowship, food, beverage, and activities. We went bowling, axe throwing, putt-putt golfing, and enjoyed incredible food along the way. Our group held strong at about 12-14 people each time, which was a tremendous gift. While we weren't able to make every month work out, we still had a blast getting together.
- Capital Campaign "Forward in Faith:" Success is the understatement of the decade when it comes to our capital campaign. Not only did we surpasses our intended gift goal, which was to reach \$600,000 in three years by almost \$200,000, we reached the \$600,000 cash in hand need within the weeks of the campaign. Our Co-Chairs, Karen Weinstein and Steve Anderson, led a powerhouse team of visionaries, worker bees, editors, and dreamers that produced an exceptional final product. Work began late in the year, but was met with incredible energy and oversight from our Phase 1 Build Team and superintendent of building, Garry Miller. We are blessed by such devotion from our teams and the final renovations will provide wonderful space to grow our ministries.
- TLU Internships: We were blessed to take on two interns, both youth ministry and theology, in the fall semester. Connor Lucas and Jordana Gutierrez both joined out staff, beginning in late July through the middle of December. They oversaw the rekindling of our Sunday morning children's Sunday School programs, reaching out to our high school and middle school youth and being present in their activities, helping to lead worship, and preparing for subsequent semesters. This is a wonderful program to be a part of and we are truly blessed as a church and l as a pastor, to have interns among us.
- Rebirth of Children's Sunday School: Using Sparkhouse's "rotation" style Sunday School
 material, our interns oversaw the implementation of a new way of learning and experiencing
 God's Word. For four weeks at a time, a single story of the Bible was read, with different games,
 activities, and kinesthetic learning each week. These lessons involved creative drama, science
 experiments, arts and crats, and cooking. Our numbers continue to be small each week, but
 they are steady. I am extremely grateful to Connor and Jordana for their leadership and energy
 to keep pushing this program forward.

- ELCA Church Council: I continued to serve as a member of the ELCA Council and Executive Council. We met throughout the year both online and in-person. Council continued to work through the restructure that came with the "Future Church" initiative and following August's national assembly, were then given a new slate of topics, programs, and growth areas to look at and work through over the next triennium. Committee reassignments and other changes on the Council level also took place, which will mean new rhythms and work in the coming year.
- Chamber of Commerce Board: I continue to serve as a member of the Chamber Board, meeting once a month, and was honored to be asked to be this year's MC for the end of year Chamber Gala. The chamber has undergone quite a bit of leadership change these past two years, with a rekindling of its committees and a recentering on its strategic plan and mission. I am blessed to be on this team and look forward to the work we will do in the coming year.
- GVCCC Board: I continue to represent our church on the GVCCC Board and currently serve as Vice President. The Counseling Center saw a move this past year to a new location on River Street that will provide ample space to grow, opportunities to bring on new clinicians, and potential to expand our intern program with college and university residents. Gideon Harris continues to serve as the Executive Director and has led amid great, great change. One sad change that we faced was the passing of long-time TLU professor and therapist, Dr. Becky Vela.
- Honorary Commander Program JBSA: I continue my learning and conversations, on behalf of the Chamber of Commerce, as a part of the Honorary Commander program at JBSA. I have had a chance to tour almost all of our military installations around San Antonio, learn what programs exist at each site, and seek ways that communities, like Seguin, can better connect to or be supported by those programs. Learning how resources are shared, not shared, or what questions have or have not been asked, has become a vital part of this learning and growing as a community leader and a member of chamber board. My "tour" will continue for another calendar year.
- Completed Cross Trails Ministry Board: After 6 years, 4 of which were spent as the Vice President, I have completed my board service with Cross Trails Ministry, our Synod's summer camping program. Over the course of this time, we saw the formation a new strategic and master plan, both of which will see their completion and adoption in late 2023, dealt with the present and aftereffects of COVID, and saw the retirement of beloved staff and the hiring of new staff. I have enjoyed my time on the Board tremendously and I am ready to see all that will come their way as these new chapters unfold.

2022 Challenges

Pastoral Staff Changes: We saw and felt many changes in our ministry together this past year
and that included the departure and resignation of Pastor Kelsie. The challenges arose when
there were not two pastors handling Sunday morning ministry, nor the attention to being given
to the children, youth, and college student ministry of our church. Doing my best to pick up
those pieces and rekindle meaningful relationships with our youth and their families was and
continues to be challenging. I know we lost some people during this change, and we lost folks
well before this change. Looking back, there were signs that changes needed to happen but
finding the right pathway to make those changes happen proved to be much harder than what
meets the eye. For this I cannot say anything more than, "I am sorry." With the addition of
interns and their additional hands, we have been able to pick up and reset some things, but all
in all, we still have lots of work to do. I pray for everyone involved in this change and I wish
Pastor Kelsie, Pastor Paul, Saraya, and Eli all the best in whatever God has in store for them.

2023 Hopes

- Celebration of our Renovation Projects: I am looking forward to a tentatively set celebration Sunday, April 30th, where we will come together for an old-fashioned potluck, ribbon cutting, and special music all focused on the conclusion of our renovation projects.
- Visioning and Planning, Evangelism, Discipleship, and Stewardship: I am excited to see us undertake a focus this year on evangelism, discipleship, and stewardship. Each of these concepts are vital to our life together as a church and how we share our faith the world.
 Following the energy of our renovation, I pray we can capitalize on new and renewed ministries for our community and its members. I am also excited to see how our stewardship, both time/talents and money will shape our outreach, our youth programming, and our yet to even be thought of ministry.
- The Compass Cooperative: I am excited to unveil a brand-new cooperative middle and high school ministry for our church and three ecumenical partners, Spirit of Joy Lutheran, St. Andrew's Episcopal, and Friedens United Church of Christ. Working with Councils and leadership teams of each church, we are crafting a standalone program that facilitates weekly gatherings for this vital time of youth and faith development. More details will come available soon, but great things are already happening!
- Reimagining Summer VBS Programs: We have seen the participation in our summer VBS and Day Camp programs dwindle over the past two years. Some of that was driven by COVID, while some was driven by the lack of organization and follow-through on the part of pastoral leadership, NOT our volunteers. We are going to take a step back, reorganize, and unroll something completely different for this year. It will entail three days, one each month, June-July-August, where we will come together, have stories, fellowship, crafts, and games, and then end the morning with food and an outing.
- Deepening our Outreach Programs and Partnerships: We have been working behind the scenes rekindling old relationships or lost relationships and planning for brand new ones. These include volunteer opportunities within our Seguin area and brand-new opportunities beyond the community. Some of these programs involve greater support of our school districts and the needs of our families, while others piggyback on older projects that just need a refresher in our midst. All of these will stand to aid our energy around outreach and evangelism and provide new ways we can and will be better together.
- Returning of 5th Sunday Potlucks: Now that our renovations are nearing completeness, I am excited to see our potluck rotation coming back. I am excited to see our food ministry of fellowship/gathering come back in excited ways and to build on the success of our holiday gift bags to our homebound members, lunches on the lawn with live music, and festivals celebrating our church and its people.
- Beach Worship as a Church: I am excited to undertake a brand-new way of gathering as a church, down at Port Aransas in June. We will be able to share in fellowship as families, youth, individuals, and take time to worship out in creation, along the seashore, and celebrate who God is calling us to be. Great thing I tell you, great things!

Our Children, Youth, and Family ministry is undergoing a transitional period. This term has provided us with an opportunity to observe what is working and what is not.

Youth Group

In our fall quarter, we planned to relaunch youth group under the name Ignite Youth. The organization was intended to meet twice per month and be open to students in sixth through twelfth grade. We wanted to work with Spirit of Joy and Saint Andrew's Episcopal, and had invited their youth to join this new group. We envisioned a schedule in which the gathering location would have alternated between our three congregations. Vicar Connor and I were charged with creating the Bible study material and leading the group. However, we ultimately determined that we would not continue the youth group for our high school students. This adjustment seemed to be in the best interest of our congregation, so we began to consider ways to increase participation in our programming. This branch of our ministry is now known as Ignite Youth and Family.

Programing

It enabled us to see how we could better cater to the audience we were attempting to reach. We finally got turnout as we gained momentum and tried a variety of different programming. Leading up to that joyous occasion, we did a lot of outreach via email, postcards, and social media posts, as well as a constant drive to do better for you, our congregation. With that, I'm looking forward to seeing how this quarter plays out. We have a lot of exciting events planned that we hope you will be able to attend.

Sunday School

Ministry Responsibilities

Nursing Home Visitation and Worship Services: Providing personal care and visitation to patients
residing in Nursing and Assisted Living facilities. Currently serving patient members at Seguin
Assisted Living, Argent Court Assisted Living, Guadalupe Valley Nursing Center, Nesbit Nursing
Center, Walnut Springs Nursing Center and Windsor Court Nursing Home. Providing occasional
visits to patients as well as monthly scheduled worship services with administration of Holy
Communion. I am assisted by church members and musicians who play a vital role in assisting
to make these events successful and fulfilling experiences.

Assisting ministers are: Frances Vineyard, Johnana Clark, Tom Engler, Karen Weinstein, Elaine Giesber, Beverly Seidenschwarz, Walter Seidenschwarz, Jeanne Palmer, Gerry Harrison, Doris Jefferies and Faye Van Deusen.

- Home Visitations and Communions: Currently we have about 25 individuals or couples that we reach out to regularly and as requested when they are, for various reasons, unable to attend regular worship services.
- Hospital Visitations: Whenever our members or close friends are hospital bound, we seek to be there for them, to comfort and pray with them, and to remind them that they are precious in the sight of the Lord.
- Assistance in Worship Services as needed: Preaching, presiding, and assisting as needed in any of the many worship services provided by our church.
- Caregivers Support Group: My wife Faye and I have responded to a community wide need for support of caregivers to elderly and impaired family members. This ministry promises to be a vital support to those who feel that they are "going it alone" in the caring for loved ones with dementia issues.

2022 Highlights

- This year, under my leadership, we have served our community nursing home facilities by offering monthly worship services, as well as regular and as-needed visitations. We have provided regularly scheduled services at Seguin Assisted Living, Argent Court Assisted Living, Guadalupe Valley Nursing Center, Nesbit Nursing Center, Walnut Springs Nursing Center and Windsor Court Nursing Home.
- 2022 has been a highly rewarding year for me in serving as a worship leader at Emanuel's Lutheran Church. With many opportunities to assist be preaching, presiding, and otherwise assisting as needed in worship I have been blessed by, and am thankful for these many rewarding opportunities to serve our congregation.

2022 Challenges

- The many challenges that we have had to fight, endure, and sometimes yield to, can really all be summarized under the one heading: "Covid!" 2022 Bereavement and Senior Care Annual Report

Ministry Responsibility

As Bereavement and Senior Care Coordinator for Emanuel's Lutheran Church my main responsibility is to care for, to keep in touch with, and to give personal and spiritual support to our members who have gone through a loss, are alone, have health issues or are homebound. I also plan activities and fun outings for our Seniors.

2022 Highlights

- Sweet Hour of Prayer is a prayer group that meets once a week on Thursdays in the Small Chapel to say prayers for the World, our Nation, our Community, our Church, and for members of Emanuel's who are on the prayer list.
- "Healing Through Conversations" is a support group for people who are widowed or lost a loved one to death. The group meets once a month on the 1st Thursday of every month. We talk about our grief and discuss various topics on grief.
- Food, Fun & Fellowship has been meeting for 18 years. This is a luncheon group for those who are alone. We meet the 1st Sunday of every month. We have devotionals, sing songs, say prayers, and everyone brings food to share.
- Senior Social Club consist of people from Emanuel's age 60 and over who meet on the 3rd Thursday of every month. A main dish is provided, and everyone brings sides & desserts to share. We play games, socialize and have fun together.
- Between Jan 16 March 6, 2022 Pastor Darwin Huartson, with the help of Donna Simmons, facilitated a group called Making Your Grief Count. This 8-week workshop was designed to help those who have lost a loved one to death.
- In Spring of 2022, with the help of Donna Simmons, several members of Emanuel's trained in CPR/AED Training with Nick Bautizda with When Seconds Count. Donna also checked around and got an AED for the church and for the day school.
- Little Free Library was built, set up and dedicated with the help of Donna Simmons and Bill Salt. Bill built the Little Free Library, Donna registered it on the Little Free Library website, and it was installed & dedicated on May 22, 2022.
- Tour of the Churches in the Panna Maria area was planned and coordinated by Donna Simmons with the Panna Maria Historical Society. This outing was in place of one of our Senior Social Club luncheons.
- Seasonal DIY projects are being made by Donna Simmons for our church members who live in Nursing Homes and Assisted Living Facilities.
- Honoring Our Heroes is a program that Donna Simmons came up with after the Pandemic to honor frontline Healthcare Workers, Teachers & Administrators, Firemen, Policemen and EMS. The Congregational Care team & Donna set up dates to honor these heroes.
- Journeying Through Grief is another grief support group that I started because of the need for a grief group. It has met on Sept 16, Oct 16 and will meet again on Jan 29, 2023.
- Healing Holidays-Making Your Grief Count was a session let by Pastor Darwin Huartson and Donna Simmons. It was held on Sunday, Nov 13th.
- On Dec 2,3 & 4 the Senior Social Club along with other members of Emanuel's went to the Vespers Services at TLU. This was in place of our Senior Social Club luncheon.

2022 Challenges

The biggest, but best challenge in 2022 had to do with my desire to handle everything myself. Between leading, facilitating and organizing the many groups that I have for Seniors and those who are grieving and alone, I have learned that I had to delegate some of the responsibilities to others.

2023 Hopes

- Pastor Darwin Huartson & I will have a 3-session grief group for people here at Emanuel's on Feb 26, March 5 & 12, 2023.
- I am hoping to start up at Book Club here at Emanuel's. I am reaching out to find people who will help facilitate the quarterly book reviews.
- I hope to plan an outing in the Spring of 2023 for our Senior Social Club group and for any other church members who might want to join us.
- In May of 2023 I would like for Emanuel's to work with Nami to sponsor to a community wide seminar/workshop on Mental Health. We are just starting to make plans for this.

2022 Challenges

Lutheran World Relief Quick Quilters 2022 Annual Report

Lutheran World Relief Quick Quilters provides Emanuel's congregation with outreach opportunities.

2022 Highlights

- <u>THANK YOU:</u> Gratitude for pastoral support. Gratitude for congregational participation: donations of fabric, sheets, blankets and donations of supplies and funds for LWR Personal Care Kits and School Kits.
- <u>ACTIVITIES:</u> Planned and hosted indoor activities for God's Work Our Hands Day on September 11, 2022. Activities: assembling School Kits and Personal Care Kits, tacking quilts, and preparing sheets and pillowcases for use in quilts, and writing thank you notes to public safety personnel. Thirteen members of the Quick Quilters and 44 others participated in these projects.

There are sixteen regular participants with an average attendance of 14 at the weekly Monday morning workshop. During the morning we trim fabric, piece quilt tops, sew tops and backs, assemble quilts with a middle warm layer, tack together, and add a border. Participants often take some projects home for completion. Two additional persons worked on projects at home. During the coffee break there is time for remembering persons on Emanuel's Prayer List.

- <u>FINANCES</u>: Our finances are handled by Emanuel's Accountant/bookkeeper office. Monetary donations are included in the donor's financial records/reports. Some Thrivent Financial members have received grants of \$250 for the purchase of batting and supplies.
- <u>2022 RESULTS</u>: The 272 quilts, 104 School Kits, and 85 Personal Care Kits, were packed into 66 boxes, delivered to the tractor-trailer parked at St. John's Marion, and shipped to the LWR warehouse for overseas shipping.

Some quilts were donated to the Ladies Aid for their fundraising raffle; Emanuel's graduates were gifted quilts.

During the most recent year, among other countries, Ukraine received quilts, kits, and other essential supplies.

2022 Challenges

- Increase in purchase and shipping price for batting.
- Replace a broken sewing machine.

- Continue to sponsor these projects.
